




Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) has given an Award for Outstanding Achievement in Popular Annual Financial Reporting to the City of Covington for its Popular Annual Financial Report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2022. The Award for Outstanding Achievement in Popular Annual Financial Reporting is a prestigious national award recognizing conformance with the highest standards for preparation of state and local government popular reports.

In order to receive an Award for Outstanding Achievement in Popular Annual Financial Reporting, a government unit must publish a Popular Annual Financial Report, whose contents conform to program standards of creativity, presentation, understandability and reader appeal.

An Award for Outstanding Achievement in Popular Annual Financial Reporting is valid for a period of one year only. The City of Covington has received a Popular Award for the last six years (fiscal years ended 2017-2022). We believe our current report continues to conform to the Popular Annual Financial Reporting requirements, and we are submitting it to GFOA to determine its eligibility for another award.






FINANCIAL INFORMATION

When assessing the financial results of the government, it is important to focus on the governmental activities, which support the regular day-to-day operations of the city including public safety, public works, culture and recreation and community development. Taxes are the most significant revenue source for the governmental funds, comprising of 44% of revenue collections.

The significant increase in intergovernmental

revenue results from ARPA monies being used to support revenue loss in the general fund. Furthermore, fines and forfeitures have increased as the courts resumed normal operations following COVID-19. The lease income above relates to the implementation of GASB 87.

The breakdown of the revenue sources is shown below. The city's revenues have steadily increased over time primarily from increases in property value as well as sales taxes.



WHERE YOUR MONEY GOES

Once the city collects taxes and other revenues, the funds must be spent efficiently to provide essential services to citizens and businesses. During the fiscal year end June 30, 2023, the Governmental Funds expensed its monies as shown to the right.





The City of Covington's total Governmental Funds' Fund Balance is broken down into four categories:

Non-spendable funds: items such as inventories, prepaid expenditures and advances to other funds or entities.

Committed funds: these can only be used for specific purposes approved by a resolution of the Council.

Assigned funds: this represents amounts constrained by the City's intent to be used for specific purposes. The City Council (or their designee) may assign fund balances.

Unassigned funds: these balances represent the residual amount when the balances do not meet any of the above criterion.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURES


The City of Covington has **Capital Expense** shown a commitment to fund capital expenditures \$10,000,000 \$7,386,386 \$6,763,075 over time. patching of roads, a new roof at the city's auto shop, general government computer upgrades, and engineering for future projects. Capital expenditures are typically funded from a specific revenue source such as special purpose local option sales tax (SPLOST), grants or other one-time revenues.
